What is the RAC?

The Research Activities Committee (RAC) was established in January 2009 and is developing into a major group incorporating Research related projects and happenings within APECS; thus initiating and maintaining projects to develop world wide exchange within research categories but also across disciplines within the APECS membership. So far the RAC consists of 16 Discipline Coordinators (DCs), each representing a different Polar research field.

What does the Research Activities Committee do?

The different Discipline Coordinators are responsible for ensuring that information from various disciplines is shared with the entire APECS membership. The Discipline Coordinators collect and disseminate information relevant to the specific discipline area they are responsible for, coordinate forum and literature discussions, support the activities of APECS members regarding the organisation of workshops and seminars, and encourage the establishment of linkages between disciplines through a close cooperation with the other Discipline Coordinators. The Research Activities Committee aims at developing new research questions and approaches that integrate various disciplines and begin to identify and answer the system-level questions necessary for understanding the environs of the Polar Regions.
